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Introduction

During the 2005-06 academic year, the Association will sponsor 88 national championships, of which 41 are for men, 44 are for women, and three are for both men and women. Among the men's championships, three are National Collegiate Championships, 13 are Division I championships, 12 are Division II championships and 13 are Division III championships. Among the women's championships, four are National Collegiate Championships, 13 are Division I championships, 13 are Division II championships and 14 are Division III championships. The combined men's and women's championships are National Collegiate Championships.

A championships handbook is produced for each NCAA championship and posted on the NCAA Online Web site (www.ncaa.org).

How to Use This Publication. The handbook is divided into four sections: (1) General Administration; (2) Determination of Competing Institutions; (3) Instructions to Participants; and (4) General Championship Information. The first three sections pertain only to the respective sport, while the fourth deals with NCAA policies applicable to all 88 championships. [Note: Some policies listed in the general section have been revised by individual sports committees. The revision(s) will appear in the sport-specific section of the handbook.]

Each topic included in the handbook is referenced to other applicable areas in the handbook or in the NCAA Manuals, where appropriate. For example, if you wish to know about regional advisory committees, the basic information for that particular sport would be included in the Appendix. However, as referenced under the heading "Regional Advisory Committees," more information concerning general NCAA policy governing regional advisory committees can be found later in the handbook and in the NCAA Manuals.

Annual Forms

Expense Reimbursement Form. Expense forms with instructions will be available on the NCAA Web site in the championships administration section (www.ncaa.org/champadmin). Forms can be mailed to the director of athletics of each competing institution, if they are unable to be accessed via the Web site. Financial Report Form. A financial report from the championships site must be submitted to the NCAA not later than 60 days after the conclusion of the competition. The host institution will be sent the forms before the championships.

Determination of Competing Institutions

Advisory Committees

[Reference: Regional Advisory Committees in the Division II General Section, and Bylaws 21.4.1.4 and 21.5.1.5 in the NCAA Division II Manual.]

Sports committees shall appoint an advisory committee in each of their respective districts or regions to assist in the evaluation of teams throughout the season. Members of the 2005-06 Division II men's advisory committees can be found in Appendix F.

Championships Structure

The format for the NCAA Division II Men's Golf Championships is determined by the NCAA Division II Men's Golf Committee, subject to the approval of the Division II Championships Committee.

The NCAA Division II Men's Golf Championships will consist of both team and individual competition conducted concurrently. Eight teams and the top five individuals not with a team will be selected from each region to compete in one of five 54 hole super regional tournaments. The top team from each region within the super regional and the top individual not with a team from each super regional (regardless of region) will advance to the finals. Tiebreakers and playoffs will be used to determine advancement to the finals.

Ten additional teams will earn berths to the finals. These teams will be determined based on the previous three-year average of top 10 finishes of a super regional at the finals. For the 2006 championships, the additional super regional allotments are as follows:

- Atlantic/Southeast - Three
- South/South Central - Three
- West/Northwest - Four

Ties for 10th place in the finals will be broken using the non-sudden death tiebreaking procedures outlined in Appendix A. The team and individual champions at the finals will be determined after 72 holes of play. Elimination procedures will not be used. The number of participants allowed at the finals is 105.

Selection Procedures

The Division II Men's Golf Committee is responsible for the selection of all participants in the Division II Men's Golf Championships. Regional advisory committees assist in the evaluation of the teams and individuals. The committee, subject to the approval of the championships committee, will determine annually the total number of allocations for the championships.

The regional advisory committees conduct regional telephone conference calls and provide the national committee with their recommendations concerning the allocated

teams. The chairs of the regional advisory committees present the recommendations to the committee during a telephone conference call that will include members of the committee and a national office representative.

Selection Criteria

Teams and individuals must play a minimum of seven contests, including at least four in the spring as well as a minimum of twelve rounds during the year of which six must be in the spring in order to be considered for selections. For team selections, the minimum criteria, including the minimum number of contests and the 50 percent rule and/or 60 Division II opponents/40 Division II in-region opponents, must be completed by April 21, 2006. In addition, for an individual to be considered for selections, the individual must play in a minimum of seven contests of which four must be in the spring as well as a minimum of twelve rounds during the year of which six must be in the spring. The individual must meet these requirements by April 21, 2006.

The men's golf committee shall select eight teams (including automatic qualifiers) and five individuals not on those teams for each of the 10 regions. Regional advisory committees shall assist in the evaluation of the teams and individuals.

The regional advisory committees shall conduct telephone conference calls among its committee members, and provide the golf committee with their recommendations for the eight teams and five individuals allotted in each of the 10 regions. Besides the selection criteria listed in NCAA Bylaw 31.3, the golf committee shall consider the following:

1. Regional head-to-head competition;
2. Results vs. common opponents;
3. Stroke Differential;
4. Strength of Schedule;
5. Scoring Average;
6. Golfstat indices; and
7. Eligibility and availability of student-athletes

For teams to be considered for selections, an institution must compete against a minimum of 50 percent Division II competition or an institution must play a minimum of 60 Division II opponents, of which 40 must be Division II in-region opponents.

For junior varsity contests, the respective school must inform the host institution that its junior varsity ("B" team) will participate and that its team score should not appear on the tournament results form.

Regional Tournaments. A total of 80 teams and 50 individuals will be selected for regional competition. There will be five super regional sites where two regions will meet and conduct individual regional tournaments. The super regional tournaments will be paired as follows:

- Northeast and East Regions
- Atlantic and Southeast Regions
- South and South Central Regions
- Central and Great Lakes Regions
- West and Northwest Regions

Season Results

The Division II Men's Golf committee will use Golfstat to assist with a computerized score-reporting system. As a result, it will not be necessary for coaches to submit season results forms to the committee. However, it will be necessary for institutions to submit a team roster to Golfstat. In addition, tournament hosts must register regular-season tournaments according to the following procedure:

1. Instructions and forms have been sent to all institutions from the NCAA national office. All tournaments must be registered with Golfstat not later than October 1. Institutions that fail to meet the deadline and wish to have the tournament registered may be assessed a fine.
2. For any tournament results to be considered for selection purposes, the tournament host must properly submit the results to Golfstat within seven days of the completion of the competition or it may be assessed a \$100 fine.
3. Last day for results to be considered for selection purposes will be April 21.
4. If a regular-season tournament is to be played according to a format different from the standard four out of five, four out of six or five out of six, the tournament director must submit the format to the committee not later than December 1.
5. Institutions that fail to fully register with Golfstat may be assessed a fine.
6. For any regular-season competition to be considered for selection purposes, the competition must be conducted on a golf course that meets the following minimum yardage relative to par:
 - Par 70—6,000 yards
 - Par 71—6,100 yards
 - Par 72—6,200 yards

Certification of Eligibility/Availability

[Reference: Certification of Eligibility/Availability in the Division II General Section, and Bylaws 3.2.4, and 31.2.1.7 in the NCAA Division II Manual.]

Only student-athletes eligible under Bylaws 12, 13, 14, 15 and 16 may compete in NCAA championships. In accordance with Bylaw 3.2.4, member institutions are required to certify the eligibility of their student-athletes before the beginning of each academic year and to withhold ineligible student-athletes from all intercollegiate competition. Member institutions are reminded to notify the NCAA national office before the selection date for each championship of any student-athlete who may have participated in regular-season competition but subsequently is determined to be ineligible or unavailable for NCAA championships competition.

The championships liaison must be notified before Friday, April 21.

Instructions to Participants

Adjusted Place Standings

[Reference: Bylaw 31.2.2.4.a in the NCAA Division II Manual.]

If a student-athlete is found to be ineligible, that individual's performance shall be stricken from the championship record, the points the student-athlete has contributed to the team's total shall be deleted, the team standings shall be adjusted accordingly and any awards involved shall be returned to the Association.

Audio Coverage (Radio and Internet)

Awards

Official NCAA awards will be presented to the first four teams in the golf championships as well as the top ten individuals. A team trophy and six individual awards will be presented to a teams finishing first, second, third and fourth in the championships. Participation certificates will be provided to all student-athletes competing or in uniform in the championships. These certificates will be sent to the institution's director of athletics after the competition.

Cars, Carts and Caddies

Carts, pull carts or caddies may not be used by participants in the championships, including practice rounds.

Golf carts will be provided for members of the games committee and selected tournament officials. The use of carts by any other personnel (including coaches, players and spectators) must be approved by the appropriate NCAA golf committee. The only exception to this policy would be if the participant is permanently disabled. A written request must be submitted to the appropriate golf committee with accompanying medical statements requesting the use of a cart or pull cart.

Drug Testing

[Reference: Drug Testing in the Division II General Section, and Bylaws 18.4.1.5 and 31.2.3 in the NCAA Division II Manual.]

Student-athletes who compete in these championships may be subjected to drug tests in accordance with Bylaws 18.4.1.5 and 31.2.3, and may be determined to be ineligible as a result thereof. Only student-athletes who have consented in writing to such testing are initially eligible for these championships; and thereafter, student-athletes who are tested shall remain eligible only if they test negative.

Equipment

The type of equipment (i.e., balls, clubs) to be used shall be determined by the

individual team and must be acceptable under USGA rules. The USGA one-ball rule (brand) will be in effect. Golf bags must have the name or logo of the school on them.

Players and coaches will be required to use nonmetal spiked shoes during regional and championships competition.

Games Committee

The games committee at each regional and the championships shall consist of the members of the golf committee present at the respective regional or championships, the head rules official, the host institution's tournament director (or designee), and other individual(s) appointed by the chair of the golf committee. The games committee will make all decisions pertaining to the conduct of the tournament, including, but not limited to, pairings, golf course setup, and protests.

Lineups and Substitutions

During registration, the head coach must submit his or her lineup according to playing position. The five contestants from each institution must be determined by the conclusion of registration. A player may be substituted before the first tee time of his team of the first round of the regional or championships, if the head coach notifies the games committee before the first tee time. The substitute must assume the position of the replaced player.

Lodging

Teams are required to stay at the designated hotel property(s) for the regionals and championships or assume the financial responsibility.

Media Arrangements

[Reference: Programs (page 15) in this handbook.]

All requests from the media for working press credentials for the NCAA golf championships should be directed to the host media coordinator. Working credentials shall not be mailed.

Media Credentials. The NCAA shall control the issuance of media credentials for each of its championships. Media credentials shall be assigned in accordance with the following priorities: (1) campus media certified by the director of athletics and/or sports information director of each participating and host institution, (2) certified media from the immediate locale of the championship or the immediate locale of the competing teams and (3) other certified media.

Credentials will not be issued to representatives of any organization that regularly publishes, broadcasts or otherwise promotes the advertising of "tout sheets" or "tip sheets" or other advertising designed to encourage gambling on college sports events. In addition, credentials will not be issued to representatives of telephone reporting services and professional sports organizations.

Other conditions for obtaining media credentials may be implemented, based on the circumstances at the championships site. These conditions must be approved before the competition by Donnie Wagner at the NCAA, P.O. Box 6222, Indianapolis, Indiana

46206-6222 (317/917-6222).

Microphones. The placement of microphones on a team coach or student-athlete is prohibited at all NCAA championships.

Postcompetition Interviews. Immediately after a 10-minute cooling-off period (i.e., 10 minutes after a player completes his or her round), an interview area will be open to all certified members of the news media, and any coach and student-athletes requested by the media will be available for interviews. If a team or individual is participating in an awards ceremony, the cooling-off period will begin immediately after the presentation.

All coaches and student-athletes must be made available for post-competition interviews following the “cooling off” period. This not only applies to formal press conferences, but also to any interview requests made to coaches and/or student-athletes not involved in the press conference. Failure to do so may result in possible misconduct, as determined by the respective sport committee.

Regardless of any regular-season radio or television contract(s), the coach is obligated to the entire covering media during the championships and must report to the interview room immediately after the 10-minute cooling-off period. The coach cannot delay a postcompetition interview with the covering media to conduct a program for a single newspaper, radio or television reporter, unless requested to remain for a short interview (not to exceed four minutes) by the television entity that has been granted television rights by the NCAA.

Coaches cannot make themselves available to selected media representatives before the conclusion of the 10-minute cooling-off period. They may, however, report to the interview area before the cooling-off period ends and make themselves available to all media representatives staffing the championships. The NCAA championships have an “open locker room policy,” which is administered by the media coordinator on site. All coaches and student-athletes must be made available for postcompetition interviews following the “cooling-off” period. This not only applies to formal press conferences, but also to any interview requests made to coaches and/or student-athletes not involved in the press conference. Failure to do so may result in possible misconduct, as determined by the respective sport committee.

Meetings

[Reference: Misconduct in the Division II General Section, and Bylaws 31.0.2.3 and 31.1.8 in the NCAA Division II Manual.]

The games committee at each of the regionals and the championships will conduct a prechampionships meeting to review tournament procedures, local rules, misconduct and items of importance to the championship. It is mandatory that each coach or institutional representative attend these meetings. A fine (\$100) will be assessed for violation of this policy. The meetings will include information on the provisions of Bylaw 31.1.8, which prescribes conditions under which a student-athlete or representative of an institution may be disqualified from further participation in the championships for reasons of misconduct.

The meetings are scheduled for Sunday after the practice round at the regionals,

and on Monday evening at the championships. The meetings at the regionals and championships should take place with the student-athletes present.

News, Media, Press Conferences and Satellite Feeds

Officials

The golf committee shall appoint a head golf rules official (“Head Rules Official”) for each regional and the championships. The Head Rules Official shall recruit a number of golf rules officials sufficient to properly administer the tournament under USGA and NCAA rules. The host institution is responsible for securing lodging for the rules officials. Officials will receive a \$45 per diem for each day worked during the championships.

Pairings and Tee Times

Both the first and 10th tees will be used for the entire competition. However, the games committee reserves the right to use only the first tee or mini-wave, if necessary, to accommodate a weather delay.

Tee times will not be altered to accommodate travel schedules.

Regionals. After all teams and individuals have been selected, the Division II Men’s Golf Committee will assign pairings and tee times for the first round based on seed within each region. For the second and third rounds, teams and individuals will be paired according to score. Pairings are outlined in Appendix D. For purposes of ranking teams for second- and third-round pairings, ties will be broken by using the non-sudden-death tiebreaking procedure outlined in Appendix A.

Championships. Teams will be paired in threesomes according to seed for the first and second rounds (see Appendix E). Pairings for the third and fourth rounds will be according to actual results. Ties will be broken using the non-sudden-death tiebreaking procedure outlined in Appendix A.

Practice

One 18-hole practice round will be scheduled before the regional tournaments, and two 18-hole practice rounds will be scheduled before the championships finals. Ten days before the first practice round, participants and coaches will not be permitted to set foot on the golf course or use the practice facilities. No exceptions will be made; however, the host institution’s team shall be exempt from this policy. Violations of this policy may result in sanctions listed under NCAA misconduct provisions or disqualification for a team or an individual(s), with no substitution permitted.

In an effort to maintain the conditions of the course and speed of play, it is required that each individual play only one ball during any practice round (“one practice-ball rule”). However, each player may chip or putt more than one ball on or around the green only.

Each participant must wear soft spikes and play from the designated tees. Violation

of these policies will result in the player and/or team being removed from the golf course, and may result in sanctions listed under the NCAA misconduct provisions or disqualification for a team or an individual(s), with no substitution permitted.

[Reference: Pairing formula in Appendixes A, D and E.]

Teams are limited to five players during practice rounds. Groups of six are not allowed, and coaches are not allowed to play during any practice round.

Head coaches or designated official institutional representatives will be required to be with their teams during the entire practice rounds. Coaches will be provided time schedules and be responsible for monitoring pace of play, misconduct and the enforcement of the one practice-ball rule.

Practice-round times at the regionals and championships will be assigned by the respective NCAA golf committee. It is not required that institutions participate in practice rounds.

In addition to the practice policies above, the following will be enforced for the regionals and championships:

1. Only credentialed, designated individuals may be allowed in the practice areas.
2. Teams may not start a practice round other than during its designated time or position.
3. Players may not go back on the course to practice after concluding each round.
4. Players and coaches are permitted on the course starting with the beginning of the first practice day and throughout the championships, as a spectator.
5. The driving range and putting green will be open one hour before the first tee time each day and will remain open until 1 1/2 hours after the completion of play for the day or sunset, whichever occurs first.

All practice-round tee times will be determined by seed and are outlined in Appendixes D and E.

Programs

[Reference: Advertising in the Division I General Section and Bylaw 31.1.12.1 and 31.6.3 in the NCAA Manual.]

Host Communications, Inc. will be responsible for all program production including layout and design, advertising, printing, vending and distribution to the championship sites. All items will be reviewed and approved by the NCAA. The championship host does not need to include expenses or revenues for programs in the proposed championship budget.

Host Communications will work with the championship host to determine if a local advertising representative should be hired to sell ads for the specific program. Some programs will not include local ads. In addition, Host Communications will:

- Send NCAA advertising guidelines as needed.
- Contact the appropriate sports information director to obtain the required team information.
- Handle vending and distribution of the programs. A representative of Host Communications will contact the championship host with additional information.

As soon as a team is selected for the championship, the sports information director

of that institution should rush appropriate information to Brad Johnson, Host Communications, Inc., 904 North Broadway, Lexington, Kentucky 40505 (phone: 859/226-4536; fax: 859-226-4575; e-mail: brad.johnson@hostcommunications.com).

Appropriate information would include: Media guides, roster (including name, position, uniform numbers, class, hometown, etc.), season record (including game scores in order played), statistics, a team picture and a brief summary of the team's season.

NCAA souvenir programs are divided into three categories: individual programs, preliminary programs and program guides.

Preliminary rounds (first and second rounds and regionals) shall receive preliminary programs while the championship site will receive an individual program.

Preliminary Programs. Preliminary programs include specific team information, NCAA informational pages and sport- and division-specific features. The program may include NCAA corporate champion and/or partner ads, noncompeting national ads, and black-and-white sport-specific ads.

These programs will be comprehensive and include all teams for all preliminary rounds per sport and division.

The championship final site will receive an individual program.

Individual Programs. All souvenir championship individual programs, with the exception of those for the Division I Men's and Women's Basketball Championships, will include the following five complimentary pages:

Two black-and-white editorial pages on the host's choice of the following topics: host institution, host city and host facility. In the event that more than one institution or agency acts as host for a championship, each additional host will receive one editorial page.

Two complimentary black-and-white advertising pages, which allow the host institution the opportunity to provide contributors to the championship with limited advertising space. The contributor may be given a page in the program (or a portion of the page) as part of its contributor package. However, the ad may not use any NCAA marks, including the championship name or logo, in its design. The complimentary pages may not be used for host institution-related advertising (i.e., volleyball camp, season basketball tickets).

One patrons' page to recognize individuals and/or companies for their contributions to support the championship. This page may not use any NCAA marks, including the championship logo, or mention the name of the championship. In addition, it may not include the logos of contributing companies. Acceptable terminology would be something like the following: "The University of _____ would like to thank the following people and corporations for their generous contributions to the local organizing committee."

The host institution is responsible for providing this information to Host

Communications. The use of the complimentary advertising pages is subject to NCAA approval.

If space is available for additional color advertisements and the host wants to utilize color pages for its complimentary ads, the host or advertiser must pay the difference between the cost of a color full-page ad and a black-and-white full-page ad.

Individual programs include specific team information, NCAA informational pages and sport- and division-specific features. The program may include NCAA corporate champion and/or partner ads, and noncompeting national ads. Host Communications will work with the host institution to determine if a local advertising representative should be hired to sell ads for a specific program. NCAA advertising guidelines will be sent by Host Communications as needed.

All program pages are subject to NCAA approval. Guidelines are subject to NCAA changes.

Radio

Please refer to the NCAA Broadcast Manual policies and guidelines that can be found at www.ncaasports.com/broadcast.

Registration

It is recommended that the registration desk be operated by the host institution and set up at the headquarters hotel or golf course. Golf-oriented people should be responsible for check-in procedures.

At the finals, teams will be provided with money clips to be used as a credential that must be visible at all times. Individual competitors will also receive a money clip.

Rules

Per NCAA Bylaw 17.33, member institutions shall conduct all of their intercollegiate competition in accordance with the playing rules of the Association in all sports for which the NCAA develops playing rules. For those sports in which the Association follows rules that are developed by other governing bodies and modified by the governing sports committee, the adopted playing rules shall be used. The governing sports committee will not consider any results for selection purposes that are not played in accordance with NCAA rules, or those rules adopted by an outside organization.

The NCAA Division II Men's Golf Championships shall be conducted according to the USGA Rules of Golf, with the exceptions listed below. Rules of Golf decisions shall be final and cannot be appealed.

1. Advice—In addition to the provisions of Rule 8-1, the Note under Rule 8 of the USGA

Rules of Golf will be in effect. Thus, each team may appoint its head or assistant coach to give advice to, or ask for advice from, participants on that team provided that:

- a. only one person is appointed to give advice to, or ask for advice from, participants on that team at any one time.
- b. if the person is other than the head coach, the person is identified to the games committee before the start of the competition each day;
- c. the person does not give advice to, or ask for advice from, another team's players or coaches;
- d. the person is not given advice by any other representative of that team; and
- e. the advice is given in a private manner that does not unduly delay play.

The player may ask for advice from, or give advice to, the appointed person in accordance with a, b and e above.

Advice includes pointing out the line for putting.

Penalty for breach of condition:

By a player—two strokes.

By a coach—two strokes will be added to the coach's team's score.

2. Unsportsmanlike Conduct—In addition to the following policies, coaches, administrators and student-athletes shall be subject to the misconduct policies described in the Division II General Section.

During the round, defined as from the time the player hits the first shot until the score card has been signed, at the first offense of any act of unsportsmanlike conduct during the championships (super-regionals and finals), the student-athlete and coach will be notified immediately on the golf course and provided a warning. The offending institution's director of athletics will receive a letter from the NCAA informing the institution that one of its student-athletes had been warned for unsportsmanlike conduct during the championships. The second offense of unsportsmanlike conduct will result in a two-stroke penalty assessed to the individual with no appeal. Further unsportsmanlike conducts would result in disqualification for that round and ultimately the championship. Any unsportsmanlike conduct incurred at the super-regionals would be carried over to the finals. However, the committee shall have the right, without warning, to impose a two-stroke penalty for any flagrant act of unsportsmanlike conduct.

3. Pace of Play—USGA Rule 6-7 states, in part: "The player shall play without undue delay" and thereafter prescribes penalties for slow play. In order to prevent any such penalty, it is suggested that the following guidelines be carefully reviewed:

Definition of "Out of Position"—The first group to start will be considered out of position if, at any time during the round, the group is behind the prescribed schedule as detailed on the Pace of Play Time Chart provided to the head coaches.

Any following group will be considered out of position if it (a) is taking more than the allotted time to play and (b) reaches the tee of a par-3 hole and the preceding group has cleared the tee on the next hole, fails to clear the tee of a par-4 hole before the preceding group clears the putting green, or arrives at the teeing ground of a par-5 hole when the preceding group is on the putting green.

Note: Both (a) and (b) must apply for a group to be out of position.

Group Out of Position—Golf rules officials (or those individuals designated to handle these duties) have been instructed to notify the players in a group if they are (1) lagging behind out of position and are being monitored or (2) have regained their proper position.

Timing of an out-of-position group will be handled by the golf rules officials or those

individuals designated to handle these duties.

Monitoring—Any player in a group out of position who takes 40 seconds or more to play a stroke will be warned for the first violation, will incur a penalty of one stroke for the second violation, two additional strokes for the third violation, and disqualification for the fourth violation under USGA Rule 6-7.

Note: If the group in question regains its proper position, any previous timings of more than 40 seconds will be carried over for the remainder of that round, in the event the group requires additional monitoring.

Timing—The timing of a player's stroke will begin when the player has had a reasonable opportunity to reach his ball, it is the player's turn to play and the player can play without interference or distraction. Time spent walking backward or forward for determining yardages will count as part of the time taken for the next stroke.

On the putting green, timing will begin after a player has been allowed a reasonable amount of time to lift, clean and replace the ball, repair his ball mark and other ball marks on the putting line, and remove loose impediments on the line of the putt.

Rulings or Other Incidents—If a ruling or some other legitimate delay occurs that causes the group in question to lose its position, that group is expected to regain its position within a reasonable time.

The USGA Rules of Golf shall be followed along with any local rules the games committee deems necessary. Members of the respective golf committees and the golf rules officials will be available for interpretations of the rules and other decisions governing the competition. Penalties based on the Rules of Golf are not subject to appeal.

Scoring

Scorecards shall be kept in strict accordance with Rule 6-6 of the USGA's "Scoring in Stroke Play." The scorecard shall be deemed returned to the committee when it is placed by the player or coach in the box located in the scoring area.

A daily team score is computed by totaling the lowest scores of four of the five team members. The final team score is determined by totaling each daily score. Golfstat will provide the computerized scoring system for the championships.

Spectators

Spectators should remain on cart paths or in the rough- and approximately 15 yards from the players. There may be no communication between players and spectators that could be deemed advice of any nature for the duration of the 18 holes. The designated coach is the only person permitted to dispense food or drinks to players. All institutional personnel, with the exception of the designated coach, are considered spectators. Permanently disabled spectators who may attend the championships should contact the host institution before arrival to assist with accommodations.

Squad Size

[Reference: Per Diem and Transportation in the Division II General Section.]

An institution may not compete with more than five contestants. Transportation expenses and per diem (as specified in the transportation section) will be provided for a maximum of five participants per team and all individual qualifiers in the

championships. Institutions represented by individuals will be reimbursed for one nonathlete. The NCAA will pay transportation and per diem for one nonathlete for teams and individuals represented. Transportation expenses shall be paid only for the championships competition and not for regional qualifying tournaments.

Per diem shall be paid for regional qualifying tournaments.

Stoppage of Play

The NCAA Division II Men's Golf Championships are to be 72-hole tournaments, if at all possible, and only the games committee or its designated representatives may make a decision to shorten the tournament.

Regionals. The games committee will do everything possible to complete 54 holes. If the afternoon wave cannot complete the round, its round will not be continued and the regional shall be deemed completed. If a minimum of 36 holes cannot be played because of inclement weather, the committee will select the regional's representatives to the championships, taking into consideration 18-hole scores.

If play during a particular round must be stopped, players will be notified and USGA Rules 6-8 and 33-2-(d) will be followed.

Television

Please refer to the NCAA Broadcast Manual policies and guidelines that can be found at www.ncaasports.com/broadcast.

Tickets

[Reference: Tickets in the Division II General Section and Bylaw 31.1.11 in the NCAA Division II Manual.]

Ticket prices and policies for the championships are determined by the games committee (subject to the approval of the respective NCAA golf committee) in accordance with the host institution's own ticket policy. Ticket sales are not required at the championships.

Ties

For the regionals, playoffs (time and weather permitting) will be used for breaking ties for advancement to the championships. If a playoff is not possible, the tiebreaking procedures outlined in Appendix A will be used.

For all championships, sudden-death playoffs will be used for breaking ties for the individual and team championships. If a playoff cannot be completed that day, cochampions will be named.

[Reference: Playoffs Procedure in Appendix A.]

Training Facilities

Training facilities will be made available to the competing teams by the host institution.

Uniforms (Regionals and Championships)

[Reference: Bylaw 12.5.4 in the NCAA Division II Manual.]

Contestants must wear uniforms of the same color during competition or practice. Walking or Bermuda shorts are permitted, provided they are team shorts and are of the same color. Slacks or shorts may be worn at the individual's discretion, provided they are of the same color and are considered the team uniform. If a student-athlete wears headgear during competition, it must display only an institutional, conference or NCAA logo, or no logo. If there is no logo a coach's or team member's headgear must be of an institutional color. A manufacturer's logo may appear on the side or back of the item, as long as it conforms to NCAA Bylaw 12.5.5. For television purposes, it is recommended that each institution attempt to wear a uniform that reflects its school colors during the final two rounds of the championships.

In the best interest of intercollegiate golf and the championships, participants must wear appropriate golf attire at the tournament site. Please refer to the host institution's pretournament mailing for the definition of appropriate attire at the golf course.

Use of Logos on Equipment, Uniforms and Apparel

A student-athlete may use athletics equipment or wear athletics apparel that bears the trademark or logo of an athletics equipment or apparel manufacturer or distributor in athletics competition, provided that in the case of:

- a. Athletics equipment (e.g., shoes, golf gloves and umbrellas), the item bears only the manufacturer's normal label or trademark, as it is used on all such items for sale to the general public; and
- b. An institution's official uniform and all other items of apparel (e.g., socks, headbands, T-shirts, windgear, raingear, wristbands, visors or hats and towels) that are worn or used by student-athletes in competition, the items may bear a single manufacturer's or distributor's normal trademark, not to exceed 2-1/4 square inches, including any additional material (e.g., patch) surrounding the normal trademark or logo. The logo or trademark must be contained within a four-sided geometrical figure (i.e., rectangle, square, parallelogram).

In addition, an institution's official uniform cannot bear a design element similar to the manufacturer's that is in addition to another logo or that is contrary to the size restriction.

A student-athlete representing an institution in intercollegiate competition is limited to wearing apparel items that include only the logo (not to exceed 2-1/4 square inches) of an apparel manufacturer or distributor. The student-athlete may not wear any apparel that identifies any other entity, other than the student-athlete's institution.

These restrictions apply to all apparel worn by student-athletes during the conduct of competition, which includes any pre-competition or post-competition activities.

This bylaw will be strictly enforced at all NCAA championships and the names of individuals and institutions that are not in compliance with this bylaw shall be forwarded to the NCAA enforcement staff.

Videotapes, Films and Still Photographs

[Reference: Bylaw 31.6.4.3 in the NCAA Division II Manual.]

Institutions are permitted to videotape championships competition by their teams or their individual student-athletes for archival, coaching or instructional purposes. Each institution is permitted to use one camera and may videotape only that portion of the competition in which it participates. The videotapes may not be used for any commercial purposes. An institutional representative shall contact the event coordinator at the host site to arrange for camera space at that site.

Appendix A

Individual Medalist and Team Championship Tiebreaking Procedures

Team ties shall be broken by a sudden-death playoff counting the low four scores relative to par on each hole. Play shall continue with new scoring on each successive hole until a winner is determined. If possible, all playoffs will begin on the first tee; however, the games committee will determine the starting holes. If a playoff involves more than two teams, a shotgun format shall be used. The team playoff will be conducted first, with the playoff for individual spots to follow immediately after the conclusion of the team playoff.

Sudden-Death Playoff Procedures

Teams will draw for positions. For a two-team playoff, the winner of the draw shall have the option of the A or B positions set forth below. For a playoff involving more than two teams, the teams shall assume the drawn letter position (A, B, C, etc.) set forth below.

Two teams (A & B; tee off alternately)

#5A, #5B, #4A, #4B, #3A playoff hole #1
#3B, #2A, #2B, #1A, #1B playoff hole #1

1. Cumulative total of the noncounting scores.
2. Highest cumulative individual total.
3. Second highest cumulative individual total.
4. Third highest cumulative individual total.
5. Fourth highest cumulative individual total.
6. Lowest cumulative individual total.
7. Committee decision.

Individuals

1. That round's score.
2. Score from previous round(s).
3. Coin toss.
4. When a tie exists within a team, the individual with the lowest team position will be given the later tee time.
